put on these Coleman lanterns.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: The mantles (phonetic).

MR. MISTLER: Mantle, right.

And so I went up to Sears, there's an old lady sitting there. What she was doing was she was waiting for a space to come available, you know, over there.

And she was parked here and I was parked right behind her.

We must have sit there for six, eight minutes, maybe. And at first I thought there was maybe a dead dog or something in front of her. 'Cause I wasn't sure why she wasn't moving, you know. At that point, you're gonna hope to hell this lady's moves, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: You're in the parking lot then?

MR. MISTLER: I was in the parking lot there. We were on the west side of the building.

And she's here and I'm right behind her here. The garden supply place, I don't know if you're familiar with the Sears mall back then. The garden supply place would have been right here, and there's a door that came out there where customers could go in and out, if you're going in to the store, you had to go through the garden supply place.

I waited behind this old lady for six, eight

minutes at least, because traffic kept coming this way. So finally there was a break in the traffic coming this way, and I'm starting to pull out and around her, because now I know what she's doing, you know.

But as I'm going -- starting, I see this car coming down, so I have to wait. So now this car comes down, it comes down this way and it stops just about -- their front fenders would have been across from each other almost, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Him and the woman in front of you?

MR. MISTLER: The woman in front of me was going this way.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: That's what I mean, that's whose fenders we're talking about.

MR. MISTLER: Right.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: She was this way getting ready to go into a parking place, and then he came down this way.

And when he stopped, their fenders would have been like this.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: You know what I mean.

So now I'm thinking, oh, shit, maybe she did hit a dog, because this guy's getting out to inspect

something.

So this guy gets out of the car and he takes -and he's putting on a T-shirt as he gets out of the car
and he's tucking it in and he's standing there and I
thought he was gonna go over to her window and start
talking to her, but he didn't do that.

He's tucking this shirt in and he's looking like this and he's walking up. Now the two cars are like this, and now he's walking up in between here and I'm right behind this lady here.

And he's walking up in here and he's going like this and the first thing T noticed, he's got like a — if you took a plate like from your coffee cup or something, and you put somebody's head in it and filled it with hair-spray and made like a plate — like a little mini-antenna.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And that was the first thing that caught my eye was this like little mini-antenna -- I've got three sisters, I thought I've seen every hairdo known to man. But this one here just -- So I'm looking at this plate, he's looking from side to side like this until he sees me. And at that point we locked eyes and the first thought I had was upright animal, mini-big foot, circus.

And before I could analyze that anymore, the guy smiles. And his hair was like -- it wasn't red, red, but if you put him in the sun, you'd see the red in the hair.

And when he smiled, his teeth were just as green as -- almost as my front yard. I mean, I thought of Christmas and Jessie McKnight. And Jessie McKnight's a kid I went to -- it was about the eighth grade.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: I was gonna ask you, I hadn't heard of Jessie McKnight.

MR. MISTLER: Jessie McKnight was a kid that I went to -- I was about eight years old at the time, he had transferred into our school, and the kid had green teeth and I remember running home and telling my mom, I wanted her to make my teeth green just like -- It was so -- And she kept saying, no, you don't want that. You know.

So -- But I thought -- I thought of Christmas and then I thought about Jessie McKnight and before I could analyze that anymore, at this point he had already turned towards the curb, so his body sorta turned and he's looking back. And now both eyes -- we're still locked eyes, and he's smiling. And as he's walking away towards the car, this eye goes over to the curb first before this one does.

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I said, holy, shit, eye tricks. You know. At this point, if this would have been vaporized, I wouldn't have been any more shocked than I was.

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And now my thinking went from I hope to hell this woman moves to I hope to hell this woman doesn't move 'cause I gotta see this goof-ball again.

'Cause there's a lady standing on the curb and she's digging with her right hand through the purse, like she probably lost her credit card or maybe her keys or something, and she's digging through this.

There had to be forty people walk past there in

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The same

this period of time.

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So, he's there and then finally the woman looks at him and she has no reaction at all. I mean, you know, that said to me that she knew him, you know, it's kinda like Uncle Buck, you know. I mean, Uncle Buck looks rough today, but Uncle Buck, you know, always looks rough, you know. So I thought she knew him, 'cause she had no -- no immediate reaction to him.

I mean, if it had been my kid and I looked down and seen that screwball sitting there that far face to face away from each other, of course, my first thing would have been to pull my kid back. And that's what I thought her reaction was gonna be, but she never made that reaction.

don't think anything's wrong and finally this lady moves. And when she moves, I put the truck into gear and I let out on my clutch and I take off. And right as I'm rolling now, I look back over just to take one more look at this screwball, and this lady and this fourteen year old girl that was with this lady digging though her purse is gone. Something — My gut said to me that there's something wrong here. It's kinda like my eyes are going what the hell's wrong and my gut's going yeah, there's something wrong, there's something

wrong.

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And I was so sure there was something wrong, because now -- now I looked around in the parking lot looking for this lady, I looked in every direction, there's no way she could have walked out into the parking lot, she wouldn't have had enough time where I couldn't have seen her. She had to have gone back into the store.

But now I'm sitting there, I'm going well, of course that's her kid, you know, it's kinda like you go to the store and you run into grandma and grandpa or Aunt and Uncle Bob and, you know, he goes home with the -- you know, takes the kid home, I mean, you know.

But I still wasn't sure.

So then I stopped and when I stopped I would have been straight across from his seat in his car and I could look into his seat. And my body was just like — it was shaking at that point, and I kept saying there's something wrong, there's something wrong here, I don't know what the hell it is, but there's something wrong.

And so when I didn't see that woman, that really scared me, because had I seen her out there, I would have ran into her and asked her if she knew him, then I would have -- But now I'm still thinking, well, of

But in the back of the seat, it's kinda like when my wife and I moved from our furnished apartment to our house years ago, we shoved everything in the car in one load, you know what I'm saying?

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: But the back seat, it was just filled. There's was clothes and all kinds of stuff and I could see the handles from like presume they were shovels of different lawn equipment things, because there was a lot of handles over there and they had all the clothes packed in, so I couldn't see what was on, you know, other than gardening tool handles, I don't know exactly what they were.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: He had two of those things that you saw trees off with. One's got a rope on it and the other one doesn't have a rope on it. And he had two of those laying over -- it would have been laying on his dashboard, the saw parts of them and the sticks going back over top of that.

He had clothes that were just stacked up, you know, there was some other crap in there, too.

He had either a toaster or a -- an iron, I'm still -- I can't make out which one was that is, but it was

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either a toaster or an iron, it was sitting on the very top of all this pile of clothes and stuff.

So then I knew, hell, they couldn't have even gotten in the car if that's what he was here to pick him up for. Was that still make him with him or not with him, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Ub-huh.

MR. MISTLER: So, he's still on the curb there and they were both there and when I had seen the -- all the clothes in there and that nobody could get in there, my fuckin' body began to shake. It's -- It just was like shaking 'cause I kept saying there's something wrong, there's something wrong. But what the hell is it.

And then my body kept shaking and it just got worse and worse and it's kinda like it's pouring gas on a fire, you know, you just -- it just kept feeding and getting worse.

I'm going now, this is ridiculous, you know, what the hell's wrong. This guy isn't jerking this kid off there, dragging him down the street or anything.

I was at such an angle where now where I'm parked, I couldn't -- it was hard for me to see, so I had these, what they call, California mirrors, I had adjusted that out, you know, so I could still catch him, you know, looking when they were up on the curb.

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Now, he's standing on the side -- he's on the side of the curb with him there now and -- and they're standing, they're not moving towards the thing and I don't know if they're waiting for the other, you know, people to come back out of the store or what.

So my body's still shaking, hell, if they walk past me then I couldn't have -- I just couldn't have unlocked.

At one point, this foot was shaking on the edge of the -- the brake pedal and I was afraid it was gonna slip off and had it slipped off, there was no way I could move.

So I was trying to unleash my hand off the gear shift, and when I couldn't do that, that just made it worse. I mean, now this thing — My fuckin' body just went — it was just like vibrating. That's only the second time I've ever had that happen. This went on for about three minutes.

And the other time in my life when it happened, it only happened maybe ten seconds.

But my fuckin' body was vibrating at this point, I couldn't release this thing. I couldn't release this hand. I couldn't turn my fuckin' head now.

So I'm sitting there and I'm just -- I'm pinned.

They could have walked right past me at that time, but,

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no, still they hadn't came. They're not -- I don't know where they are. I can't even look back at this time.

So eventually I was able to take and just kinda lean over and in the mirror I could see where they were at and they weren't standing there anymore.

And I felt, oh, that means they went inside.

So that really brought me down, everything's fine, they went inside and now I'm unlocked.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: The car was still out?

MR. MISTLER: The car was still there.

And now --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: How far from the car were you at this time?

MR. MISTLER: I was directly across from it, three or four feet.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. You hadn't moved anymore?

MR. MISTLER: No, no.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Was the woman still blocking you in front?

MR. MISTLER: No, no, she had gone at this point.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: So you were holding up traffic now.

MR. MISTLER: Now, I'm holding up traffic. This

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woman was sitting here for twelve minutes and nobody's blows their horn. I'm on the (inaudible) for ten seconds and the whole fuckin' parking lot's going nuts back here. Which I didn't care, because I wanted to make sure on this.

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So now I get unlocked because I don't see him in the mirror. Now, I looked good, and the more I look and I don't see him, the more I unlocked I'm getting and finally I turned around and I looked and they're gone.

I thought, well, shit, they went back inside.

Here I am, you know, getting ready to go on vacation and I'm making a mountain out of a mole hill, I'm letting my -- my fuckin' mind run away with me. You know, any number of things.

So then I start to pull out and I decide to take one last look and as I take one last look, I see his back, this part of his back. What he had did is they had stepped off of that curb and now he's in front of the car, but he's leaned over this way, you know, and he would have been just -- if this is the hood of the car, his back would have been like this.

And I couldn't see Adam over there.

And so I catch what I think is his back. So now I slam on the brakes again. And now I'm at the back of

the car, a little bit past the tail-end of it. And now I'm waiting for these -- for them to come around here, 'cause I want to get one more look, I want to see what this kid's doing.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: So then while I'm sitting back there at the back, you know, I got (inaudible) body man, I'm looking this Cadillac over and the more I look at this Caddy, the better it looks, I mean, instantly I knew it was a '91 or a '81, or '71, '71, '72, they're identical. And instantly I knew this Caddy was ten years old.

And it was clean as a damn pin. And the more I'm looking -- And now I look at this tag and it's got a 1E tag, I said, wait a minute, that's a rental car tag.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: 18?

MR. MISTLER: 1E. That's a rental car tag.

I said, is this a rental car, ten years old, Aluchia (phonetic) County. Hell, I didn't even know where Aluchia County was at.

So I thought this was maybe a rental car. But then -- You know, I couldn't get past a ten year old -- who the hell rents ten year old cars. Maybe in Aluchia County they do.

And I'm looking at this car and I'm looking at it,

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and he just doesn't fit in this car. I'm -- If the side had been ripped out or something, then it'd be a beater (phonetic), this guy would have fit, but he just didn't fit in this Caddy. This Caddy was clean. Other than it had well water all of the hood of it, this car was clean.

And in the back he's got like a dent in the back bumper on this thing. And a body man's eye I'm saying, what the hell caused that dent, a motorcycle hit it.

If a motorcycle hit it, then the inertia would have carried it up under the deck lid. There'd be marks on the deck lid.

I looked up on the deck lid, there were no marks on the deck lid and at that time I looked around the window, there was no rust around the window either. He must have backed into a pole, because it didn't even touch the deck lid. The bumper had like a long narrow dent in it.

So that was the only dent in this whole car, you know.

So now I'm still sitting there, the parking lot's erupted by now, I mean, they're going nuts. I got this guy two cars back, every ten seconds getting out calling me a son-of-a-bitch every way he can, you know, move it you son-of-a-bitch, come on, you know, what the

hell you waiting on, you son-of-a-bitch. You know. I didn't care, I wasn't moving, I wasn't going anywhere until I was sure.

So then it seemed like it took him forever. You know, I mean, this it probably was only minutes, but it seemed like forever.

So then they come around the car, they're both walking real slow, and right as they come around the front corner of the car, Adam sort of looked up and he had that ball hat, and Otis reached down and pushed the ball hat out and I started to come out of the truck then, 'cause I remember doing that to my kid, you know. Pushing his hat down, if he does that again, I'm coming out.

So I'm watching the kid, I'm watching Otis and they're walking up through there so slow and a few more steps later Adam looked at him and he looked down and he smiled, and I thought of my grandfather, he used to do that. He had red hair, too. I remember him smiling at me and that really brought me down. And the kid wasn't fighting, he wasn't trying to get away, hell, he didn't even look scared. He wasn't like pulling. I was looking for, you know, his feet to shuffle, anything, any signal that this guy's doing this against this kid's will.

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He never sent any signal.

MR. MISTLER: I'm still right on the very back. I would be right across the very end of his back car where I can look at his tag, maybe a couple feet past his car. My driver's door would have been a couple of feet past the end of his car.

So now I'm watching in there, and he takes the hat off, he's not holding the kid down or nothing, the

kid's not flaring trying to get up from him. He takes the hat and he lays it on the back of all this stuff that's right behind there.

Because when I thought of Christmas in that lot that day, and I remember telling the detective, I remember thinking of Christmas, I remembered three things.

First the red and green in his hair, which reminded me of Christmas. This kid had on green pants and that red hat.

When they got around to the side of the car, it had green interior and I remember that little thought, you know, where the hell's the red, and now there's the red. The hat, again.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: What would you say at this point if I told you that he didn't have a red hat on.

MR. MISTLER: I'd say you were full of shit, he had a red hat on. I see that like I'm looking at you.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Ub-huh.

MR. MISTLER: I see that green interior just like I'm looking at you. I see the -- the Otis with the reddish hair in the sunlight and the green teeth, just like I'm looking at you.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. And they -- At that point they just left the parking lot.

MR. MISTLER: Then he's in the car -- Now, I was in the car and Otis is sitting there in the car. The parking lot's locked up. This guy isn't going anywhere.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Why not?

He can go where he wants to.

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MR. MISTLER: No, he can't. It's still locked up from us sitting there. Everybody has got the whole parking lot.

He may have been able to back all the way out of there.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: I thought he was northbound, you're southbound.

MR. MISTLER: He was northbound, yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Did he block the northbound the whole way?

I mean, was there a line of cars behind him?

MR. MISTLER: Not behind him.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: How come?

MR. MISTLER: What they were doing, is when they would come around that corner, they were feeding into the parking lot there.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: And at one point I started to pull behind him, but then I see this lady coming down there,

and I thought, well, shit, I don't want to block her in.

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So then I see a parking space right over here, which was only a few feet away from him, perfect. I start to go into there because I want to leave this load of cars behind me. They're going nuts now these people, you know, they're blowing their horn, I mean, they're going fuckin' nuts over there.

And at that point I thought everything's fine,
'cause I'm watching this kid, he's not flaring trying
to get away --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Ub-buh.

MR. MISTLER: -- Otis isn't holding him, you know.

And I see the car coming down here, so I don't want to block her in and so then I pull on down. This lady found one of them spots on the way down and pulled in. So there was still nobody behind him. I mean, he could have backed up out of there, it would have been a hell of a back-up job, but he could have backed up out of there.

Or he may have been able to go around the corner there, you know, to the east, right around where package pickup was. He might have been -- 'Cause I couldn't see around that corner, I didn't know if, you know -- I know at one point I'd seen cars heading out

the wrong way out of there, so I knew that was blocked at one point, but that may have become unblocked, because they were starting to get the other section blocked.

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The way Sears had it, they had it divided several different roads kinda went in and out of there. And what people were doing, because the one road was blocked, they were all coming up the wrong one, the wrong way, so everything was screwed up there and the parking lot was locked up. They were starting to get that undone. They may have got that undone, he may have went around that corner.

The parking lot had backed all the way, because like I said, there was still nobody behind him, you know.

And when I seen that parking lot -- parking space come open, I pulled over there and I was -- by the time got there somebody had pulled in front of me. So then I had to go down to the next section and now I'm down (inaudible) comes out of Sears on that side.

And I parked the car and I run back up to there because now he would have been with him for about a minute or so, and if there was a problem, I wanted to look in the car and see the kid's eyes and see, you

know, what he was thinking. Trying to see what he was thinking.

But when I went back up there the car was gone.

And then I stood up on the curb even trying to look --look around to see, you know, if I could see it.

And then I stood on that curb and I weighed everything. I said, wait a minute, what the hell's the problem here. Why isn't he with them -- Why wouldn't that woman have been his mother that's with him.

What's the problem here, you know.

I mean, what'd the guy do wrong. He didn't do anything wrong. I mean, anybody like that, he's so calm, I mean, he knew exactly what he was doing.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: He not only conned that kid, he conned me that day, too, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: So he was in the car with Adam, he put the hat up on the back --

MR. MISTLER: Put the hat up on the back and he --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: -- sat there for a second, and then he reached back around and took that hat and tucked it in between the seat and this -- He probably just did that to keep it from blowing out.

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INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right. And at that time that's when you saw a parking -- you started to go, and by the time you came back, they were gone.

MR. MISTLER: They were gone. And I looked all over trying to see where they went to.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: They didn't go out the main entrance 'cause that was still blocked up and they were still getting this one — he had either gone around this way, because I couldn't see around there, I couldn't see whether that was blocked or not —

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: -- or he had to back all the way up. INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: Which would have been tough to do.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: When did you first find out that Adam Walsh had been kidnapped, abducted?

MR. MISTLER: Well, after I left the mall that day and that, and the reason we were getting our lantern bag, the next morning, at five o'clock in the morning, which would be Tuesday morning, we had left for the national forest. Took two trucks, we had, you know, three-wheel ATC's and all of our equipment stuff, and we went up in the national forest.

We came back on the following Sunday, around three

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in the afternoon, two or three in the afternoon, something like that, and some of the neighbor kids had seen our truck coming home, so they rode their bikes over and they were in the driveway at the same time we got there.

Why wouldn't that be her -- her kid. I thought because, you know, I'm going on vacation, I get real irritable right before I go on vacation, you know. And I thought maybe that was it, you know, maybe I'm just letting this all -- making a mountain out of a mole hill-type thing.

So I went inside of the store, and by the time I

had got to that other door and walked inside the store, I was so glad that I didn't come out of that car because I know I would have thrown him to the ground and broke his fuckin' arms, I just -- I know that junk yard dog, what he was gonna do to this guy.

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And I was so glad then, because now I had weighed everything and it just seemed like I almost made a huge mistake and threw Uncle Buck to the ground or something.

So I went on in and I bought my lantern bags, which were right inside the door, halfway out to the right, went over and looked at a badminton set, which was a few aisles away, and looked at some other things there, and I got in line and as I'm standing in line here comes this crazy lady, yelling Cooter. I can hear her yelling.

She comes running up through there. And I don't know if you're familiar with Sears, but it's like a main -- the main walk -- the main walkway that goes all the way through out that way, and on this way here.

Well, I was right by the door here, so she was a pretty good distance away. And now here comes this lady and she just screaming Cooter, Cooter, and she's swinging around like -- and she got her purse carrying it like a one-bladed helicopter.

And she's swinging around, this purse is straight out in the air, she's hollering Cooter, Cooter, and she slams the purse down on the ground and she takes off running towards the south and you can hear her screaming, Cooter, Cooter, Cooter and it's getting lighter and lighter.

And then apparently she went out that door on the south side. And then apparently she came back in that door because now it's getting louder as you're hearing it come back through there.

I thought, I don't mean any disrespect to anybody,
I thought she was on a one-day pass from a nut house
somewhere.

She comes back up and now she's spinning around and they got a table about this size and they had shirts, I believe they were shirts, I'm not positive of that, but I'm pretty sure they were shirts. They used to set them up on end like this.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And they got these all these shirts, and she's just thrashing herself down on this thing.

About that time two old ladies come up alongside of her, they look like the perfect grandma, and she calms down. And I said, one of them two have to been Cooter, I thought she was Spanish, that's what I

thought Cooter meant something in Spanish like grandma or, you know, or, you know, or chaperons.

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Then she calmed down, by that time I just got my change so I walked on out and left out of the store.

Well, we went back up to the store around two, between two and four in the afternoon, it was me, my wife and my son this time.

Now, we're standing right by where the same cash register that we were earlier that day, 'cause we went back and bought the badminton set, is what it was, and now there's a blonde-haired lady standing there and there's what I believe is a cop standing next to her.

John Walsh was standing here and there was some guy that was really dressed good, I mean, standing next to him. Big heavy-set security guard was there, great big guy, he could tame a bear with a stick, you know, big black rimmed glasses and that was there, and Mrs. Walsh is there.

And now I hear her like whimpering, crying, like if you get popped for shoplifting or something like that. You know, you're not gonna be out of control, you know, maybe a teenager or maybe a woman was just like, you know, (makes sound). You know.

And at one point I heard her say, where could he be. And right before I was saying to my wife her hair

looks like the lady I saw this morning. And then I heard her speak English and then I said, it couldn't be her. 'Cause the lady in the morning was speaking Spanish.

I never connected the two, you know. In the afternoon I'm only a few feet, I'm within that wall away from her. In the morning she was a pretty good way away and spinning around. So I never connected the two, you know.

And the security guy, you know, he had asked him to put on a thing to ask him to come either to the checkout or come somewhere.

So when my wife and I heard that, she said to me, Key West and I'm thinking Key West. I'm thinking the exact same thing she's thinking, because our son drifted away in Key West once for about an hour, he drifted in the wrong room and laid down and went to sleep. And for that hour, it'd be the darkest hour of my fuckin' life. But, you know, we thought our kid was gone and all he did was just go into the wrong room and that.

So my wife said immediately Key West and I was thinking the exact same thing that she had just said to me, because we had heard that on the thing, so we figured he just drifted away in the store for a few

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minutes.

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INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: What did you hear?

MR. MISTLER: The security guard had said -- I was standing there watching him. The security guard said, go ahead and run that again.

And so then they came on the loud speaker in there and they said, will Adam Walsh please come to -- I don't know if it was the checkout counter or the service desk or, they asked him to come somewhere.

So then my wife and I we both realized that's what had happened. He had just drifted away, everything's gonna be fine, just like it was in Key West for us and — and that — by then we had gotten our change and we just left, you know. And we figured, you know, everything was fine.

So, my son had knew Adam Walsh because he played on the same playground that Adam Walsh plays on. So that day in the store, he said that's Adam Walsh's dad. He knew who Adam Walsh's dad was.

So when we came back on that Sunday and the three boys came up on their bikes and said Adam Walsh has been disappeared, my wife and I said, Jesus Christ, we saw them up at the store on Monday right before we left. Oh, everything wasn't all right.

You know, we were under the impression he had been

snatched in the afternoon there. 'Cause by then I had just forgotten about the old man and the kid in the morning. I mean, it didn't even — it didn't even enter my mind. I think I remembered that was because my son had identified the Walsh, John Walsh, so I had forgotten all about that until about a month or so goes by and I'm up at Sears and I'm sitting there and now where Otis' car would be, there's another car parked, not the same kinda car, and I would have been two or three cars back from where I was that day, and it was like somebody smacked me in the face with a two-by-four.

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I saw the grill on the car and then I remembered that weird guy and the kid. And then I remembered both things happened on the exact same day.

So I went back home and I told my wife and she said maybe you better go up to Hollywood Police and tell them. But by that time, they had pumped this blue van so many times, you know, I kept saying, well, you know — I mean, this blue van you heard about it fifteen times a day back then. It was like a — It wasn't a paid commercial, but it was like a commercial. And fifteen times a day, you know, you're hearing this blue van.

I said, you know -- She said, well, maybe -- you

know, maybe you better go on up. I said, okay, I'll go on up there.

So I go on up there, I come up Taft, I get on Park and I'm heading towards the police department, which is only a few blocks away, and I hear this blue van commercial again, but the only difference is now this blue van commercial, they put a ladder on the back of this blue van.

I don't know if you lived here back then -INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: Oh, you did. Do you know the blue van commercial I'm talking about?

And then they put a ladder on the back, I said, fuck, they're putting options on this thing. I saw a white Cadillac, I didn't see no blue van. You know, they're putting options, there couldn't be any connection, I'm not gonna waste Hollywood Police Department's time.

There's like a street or two that's got little cross-throughs, right before I got to Johnson, I turned and went back and then went on home because I was sure that the old man, the weird looking guy in the Cadillac had nothing -- you know, that wasn't important because this blue van. They brain-washed me with this blue van.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: You all along have identified Toole, Otis Toole.

MR. MISTLER: Uh-huh.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: When did you first come to that identification?

MR. MISTLER: That -- When I went up there to tell the Hollywood Police, that was about a month or so after Adam had disappeared.

So then two years goes by and Chief Sam -- Sam something, they had a news conference, they'd caught the killer of Adam Walsh. So I sat in my bedroom, hell I ran out and made a sandwich while the commercial was on and got some coffee and -- 'cause I want to see this, I mean, this is almost two years later -- it's almost two years later, they finally made an arrest. They got the guy they're saying.

So I come back in and I'm laying in that bed and I had a small TV, it's only about like that in a cabinet I had built in the wall. And I'm watching that and they flash this black and white picture of Otis up there and before my fuckin' feet touch the ground, I knew exactly who that was, that's that weird guy in the Cadillac. Instantly I knew who that was.

And even though the chief appeared to be drunk, I still believed him when he said that was definitely the

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man.

There was a female reporter there and you could tell in her voice, she said are you sure this is the man. Because by that time I was standing two inches away from that screen, and I said to this female reporter, yeah, honey, that's him and the chief said that's definitely him.

I said, see. It's like all three of us were in the same room having the same conversation. I fuckin' instantly knew, because that weird guy looked exactly like that picture. If I had a box of crayons, I could have colored it in. It's a black and white picture with the red hair and the green teeth.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Let me ask you this, Bill, two years after this occurred, you identified -- as soon as you saw O'Toole's picture or Otis Toole's picture on TV, you knew --

MR. MISTLER: I knew instantly.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: How come for two years you didn't know that Adam Walsh was the one that was abducted?

Because his pictures were in the paper --

MR. MISTLER: And his picture had a smile every time, and Adam Walsh looked like a full-grown four year old. He didn't look like a six year old. It could

have been him, it could have been a dozen other kids, too, you know. And I couldn't remember the color of the ball hat.

You know, I couldn't remember that and I couldn't remember -- I didn't remember the shorts and I didn't remember the color of the ball hat --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: How do you remember all those things now?

MR. MISTLER: I remembered that now because when I remembered thinking of Christmas, when one of the detectives (inaudible) remember thinking of Christmas. I thought of Christmas because first the kid had the red ball hat and the green pants. Otis had the red hair and the green teeth. The car had the red — or the green upholstery, so that one thought tied those three together. Up until that time, everything looked gray, I mean, I couldn't make the colors of that out.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: When did the colors come to you?

MR. MISTLER: The colors came to me on the pants and the other things once I remembered Christmas. When I remembered Christmas --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: When was that, that's what I'm trying to find out.

MR. MISTLER: That would have been when I was

talking to Jack Hoffman.

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INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay, 1991.

MR. MISTLER: '91, yeah.

A lot of pieces started coming up. When you remember one thing, something else you remember.

Where it could have been him, this kid never smiled at all that day and in that picture of him he was smiling, you know.

Adam looked like a four grown four year old. I don't know, he must have just -- I don't know if he just turned six or what, but he sure as hell didn't look like a six year old. You know what I mean, size-wise. You know, kids are funny, sometimes they'll grow like hell and other times they don't.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: In '83 when you saw this on the TV --

MR. MISTLER: Uh-huh.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- why didn't you go to the
police at that time?

MR. MISTLER: First, the chief comes on there, and like I said before, even though he appeared to be drunk, I still believe him 'cause I knew he was telling the truth. I knew this was the right guy.

Now, the chief said this is definitely the man. Now I figure, wait a minute, this is the chief of police, he had on the uniform in that press conference, hell, he probably must lead the city parade with that uniform, is the only other thing he does with it. He looked official as shit.

I know they got the right guy, Hollywood Police is on television telling me they know they got the right guy. They definitely got the right guy.

Now, before you put somebody on television that comes in there and admits to a murder, you have to tell them a hell of a lot before you do that, right?

I mean, if I walk into Hollywood Police

Department, what do I just have to get there before eleven so they'll put me on TV?

You have to give them so much information for them to make that kind of a statement on television, that, I mean, Jesus Christ, you just don't take a guy walking in and say, I popped somebody, they say, fine, thank God you're here before eleven, we'll get you on TV.

So now I'm sitting there and I'm taking the chief at his word. I mean, if the chief don't know what the hell's going on up there, who does.

But to be real sure, I wanted to see what John Walsh had to say.

So the next day, you know, we looked all that night, we couldn't find him on TV, and I know he'd been

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on TV the next day. So my wife and I took off work, it was on Wednesday and we were at home, and we took off work to deal with this. We were gonna deal with this. Was I gonna come in or wasn't I gonna come in. You know, because now the way the chief's making it sound, we don't need you Bill, what the hell do we need you for, we definitely know who this guy is.

So he had almost fully talked me out of it, I wanted to see what John said the next day.

And the next day John comes on television and he said he'd like to have five minutes alone in a room with this guy somewhere. And I say, why would he want five minutes alone in a room with this guy somewhere if he didn't believe this is the guy who popped his kid.

Of course, Hollywood Police Department had to fill him in and they definitely knew what happened. That meant I didn't have to get this skeleton out of my cupboard for doing time as a teenager. Because now Adam Walsh is bigger than the Linberg baby, ten days before Otis turns himself in, hell, there's a full length movie on him, so you're not dealing with an average local six year old kid anymore.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Why didn't you at least come forward or call the police and say, hey, this is the guy, but you know what blue van stuff's a bunch of

crap. 'Cause I saw it and we're talking a black and white Cadillac, there wasn't no van involved?

MR. MISTLER: What do you mean, call them after I had seen Otis on television?

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Yeah.

MR. MISTLER: Why should I? They definitely knew who they had.

They were so sure of who they had. I mean, it's the chief, this isn't a police spokesman, this isn't a rookie cop, this is the chief telling me. It's definitely the man.

So now John Walsh is telling me he wants five minutes alone in this room with this guy, I'm saying, wait a minute, they've got this guy pinned to the fuckin' wall, what do they need me for. They don't need me.

So to be real, real sure now, my wife and I watched the newspaper afterwards and that and they talked about four -- four murders they were interviewing this Otis on and that, and they gave him the death penalty and three life sentences eventually on those other four murders.

So, I mean -- So it's -- They're not gonna put

Adam Walsh ahead of these other four, because they

were already talking to this guy about them. It's just

like Ted Bundey, he killed maybe thirty people and they convict him on two, and where do the other twenty-eight fall, in the oh well section, and that's where Adam Walsh had fell in the oh well section, you know, they knew who did it and everything, but the state wasn't gonna spend the money or for whatever reason they weren't gonna take him and go through with it.

And so I heard nothing. And if we weren't looking I'd say, well, yeah, but my wife and I were both looking and we haven't stopped looking for information about that since that day.

(Thereupon, Tape 1, Side 2 concluded.)

(Thereupon, the following was heard on Tape 2, Side 1.)

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Just so I'm clear, the -it's your recollection today, up to today, that the
published pictures of Adam Walsh, he didn't -- that
isn't the little boy that you -- although it was Adam
Walsh that was taken, you never -- you never connected
those pictures with the little boy --

MR. MISTLER: I never connected them because first I couldn't -- I couldn't remember the color of the hat. I didn't remember the color of his pants.

I mean, but the size is what threw me off more than anything. I mean, Adam never smiled once and they

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have pictures you see all the time on the television and everything, he's always smiling, you know.

He never once smiled. But he was smaller than a six year old.

My kid, I remember what he -- you know, I remember what a six year old looks like and Adam was a lot smaller. He must have just turned six or he was small for his age, also. You know. And I could never really positively, you know --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: The license plate you're pretty comfortable with?

MR. MISTLER: Yeah. I'd say that's the exact plate. It may be a little different view, but I'm pretty sure that's the exact one.

IE5087, 'cause I remember having a thought (inaudible) I would have had them all. I believe that's the exact tag. I don't know if Smith's found it or not. And Aluchia, I see that like I'm looking at vou. A-U-A.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: When is the first time that you have a recollection of that tag number?

Have you -- Have you known that tag number since

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- the day this happened?

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MR. MISTLER: No, they put me under hypnosis twice. First -- First time they went dry, I hadn't slept in a couple days and Jack Hoffman come over and (inaudible) blow smoke up my ass, he was lying to me about Adam, I knew he was blowing smoke up my ass then.

It was kind of like a waste of my fucking time.

It sorta pissed me off, and I hadn't slept in a couple days and I wasn't even sure I wanted to get involved 'cause they kept lying to me up there.

So when we went there under hypnosis and we went to the parking lot there and this Harlick (phonetic) guy sort of took me around in the parking lot and that and we went through the same area where everything happened.

And I really couldn't get anything out then.

(Inaudible) went back over to the Hollywood Police

Department and got in my car and started home, and as I was coming through the intersection, it was kinda like a -- Have you ever seen the cash register where the numbers go cha-ching?

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: It was kinda like that.

First I saw the A-U-A next to (inaudible), Aluchia is the county. And then I saw the 508. So then I wasn't sure what area it was in.

Then they put me under hypnosis again the second time, and it came out -- it came out 508LTE and then the more I thought about and then I remembered thinking about a rental car and the L wasn't the L, it was the 1 and the E and if you move them back to the front, and then the 7 had to be the T that I had described. So once I said that, I knew that, because then I remember the other little tiny thought. The first thought it was a rental car tag and I had never seen a fuckin' 1E tag on anything but a rental car, which I found unusual to be in that parking lot.

And then I thought of the other little thought I thought about, I had them all in the row, had that other one not been a -- if the O was a 6 or something, you know, if there was one of them that was different.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Now, was you're describing to me today the thoughts about the 1E and the rental car --

MR. MISTLER: Uh-huh.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- I'm trying to -- what
I'm trying to get to, Bill, is did you -- do you today
remember thinking that the day this happened --

MR. MISTLER: Yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- or is that coming to you now after hypnosis and you see the 1E and you place

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that --

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MR. MISTLER: I remember them little tiny thoughts. You know, the little thoughts you have like how did that happen, was it a motorcycle that hit it to make that kind of a dent. You know, and then -- the inertia would have carried the motorcycle under the deck lid, I remember looking under the deck lid. Then I remember looking around the back window for rust.

And I remember the other little fellow, he couldn't have been --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Do you remember looking -- making those visual observations --

MR. MISTLER: On the day that it happened.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- or do you -- or is that something that --

MR. MISTLER: No, this -- they say I was hypnotized, I don't believe I was hypnotized, you know. But what happened was, like days -- like a day or so after, and right after you would do that, stuff would pop up. And by that time, Jack Hoffman (inaudible) was lying to me, so I wasn't -- there were a lot of things popping up and I didn't bother to telling him, you know, they were already yanking my chain.

So after I remembered, you know, a lot of things, I didn't bother telling him.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Just give me a minute.

Now, when this happened back in July of '81, you were stopped five to eight minutes.

MR. MISTLER: At least, yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: At least. Cars were backed up --

MR. MISTLER: All the up the street.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- people were blowing their horn. Do you have, in your mind, have you come up with a scenario as to why no one, virtually no one, including yourself, with all of the publicity, pictures, posters, television, newspapers, radio, that no one in all those cars, the one right behind you, which had to be right across from this happening, that no one made any mental connection --

MR. MISTLER: 1 don't think their body was shaking.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- of Toole and this little boy.

MR. MISTLER: If my body hadn't shook like that, I don't think I would have remembered either.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. What was the other time when your body shook like that?

MR. MISTLER: Back end of a semi came off on the

other side of I-95 right before Ives Dairy Road and it hit a gray '77 Grenada and I could see the blue smoke coming off, you know it was a flatbed, it wasn't an enclosed semi, but it was a full-length semi and it come separated from the truck, and when it did, it came across right this side of Ives Dairy Road.

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There was a gray Grenada and it hit -- hit her on the side, the tires hit her on the side and she straightened it up and it came over and hit her again and I kept seeing these big puffs of blue smoke on the other side of the road coming.

And then you can say what you want about lady drivers, this woman straightened that car out all three times, you know, and finally got it stopped. And then finally when she got it stopped, the back end of the semi turned and came right across the expressway at me and there was nothing I could do. I mean, I didn't have enough time to put the gas on, put the brakes on.

And right at the last second, the -- the little wheels that they got on there --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: -- it was running on those, it had dug into like the shoulder and it lifted up just like a horse would rear up and when it did, my truck went over and I could see those two little wheels right here.

And then as it slammed to the ground, I could see in the rear-view mirror the smoke, you know, like a car, you hit a car over the years it builds dust, if you've ever seen a car get hit.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Oh, yeah.

MR. MISTLER: It's like a cloud -- I still see that in my mind. This fuckin' thing come out and blocked all three lanes and didn't touch nothing over here. The only thing it hit was (inaudible).

And then as I'm driving on down the road, then it dawned on me, you know, right after that, after I look in the mirror and I seen what happened, and I was in the fast lane and my body started to shake, you know, this only went on for maybe ten seconds at the very most --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: -- and then I was able to control it and then everything was fine, and I went on down the road.

But just standing in that parking lot out there, I was shaking for a good three minutes or better, which seemed like a fuckin' eternity, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Yeah.

Is there anything else about all this you'd like to add?

MR. MISTLER: Yeah, Jack Hoffman tried to sell me a bag of shit, they were lying to me. They fuckin' knew I was telling the truth. I want to make that clear.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: They wasted my time, he repeatedly lied to me.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Anything else?

That's it?

MR. MISTLER: That's it.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Let me work on some questions here a few minutes.

Do you need to go to the bathroom or anything while I'm doing this?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: We'll try these and see how we go through the review. These questions are just —

If you have any questions about them, you need anything clarified or if you need anything changed as I review the questions with you, let me know as I come to that particular question.

MR. MISTLER: Okav.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. There are different types of questions on a polygraph test, as I explained to you earlier. There are specific questions about

where you were born, your name, a couple things like that. There are some questions about the abduction of Adam Walsh, there are some questions about your truth and veracity at different periods of your life. There are questions regarding whether or not you believe I'm gonna tell you any surprise questions, and things of that sort, those questions — every question here has a meaning to it —

MR. MISTLER: Ub-buh.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- as far as a final evaluation goes.

The questions about your veracity, that comes as a result of -- you know, you told me you lied to the police back around when you were nineteen and you're sure you did then, but other than that, you know, a couple little things like if somebody calls for your son, you don't tell any serious lies to anybody.

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: You know, just somebody wants your son or he doesn't want to talk, you say he's not here. If you're a little late, you might say I had a flat tire. You know, but you don't tell no serious lies or anything, so we just — these things just need to be clarified and make sure we can see that that's accurate over here, also.

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I review the questions, Bill, in types. I'll start with the simple questions and I'll go in groups through the questions.

During the test, the questions will be in -- it'll be mixed up, and I'll go through a series and stop, and then I'll go through another series and when I go through the other series, I'll switch the position of a couple of questions, but they won't be in specific groups. They'll be -- they'll be mixed up a bit.

MR. MISTLER: Okay.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay? For review purposes -- And I'd like you to answer all of them out loud so your answer is and know that you understand the question.

Were you born in Kentucky?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Do most people call you Bill?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Is today Tuesday?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Did you ever go to school?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Are you completely convinced that I will only ask you questions on this

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test we have reviewed?

MR. MISTLER: Yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Regarding the abduction of Adam Walsh, do you intend to answer the questions about that truthfully?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Have you lied about any of the details of Adam Walsh's in July of 1981?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Did you lie in your statements when you said that all of the details of Adam Walsh's abduction are from your personal observation?

MR. MISTLER: Sure.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Answer the question

MR. MISTLER: Yes. Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: No, no, no. Listen to the question.

Did you lie in your statements when you said that all the details of Adam Walsh's abduction are from your personal observations?

MR. MISTLER: Maybe I'm misunderstanding here.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. This is a did you lie question, in other words.

MR. MISTLER: Did I lie.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Did you lie -- Did you lie to anyone, me, Mr. Ray, Mr. Hoffman --

MR. MISTLER: Oh, no.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: You understand what I'm asking?

And it's a longer question, I apologize for it, but this type of test sometimes lends itself towards questions that have to be a little longer than I would really prefer.

So the question is did you lie in your statements when you said that all of the details of Adam Walsh's abduction are from your personal observations?

MR. MISTLER: I didn't lie about that, no.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Your answer is -- is no to that question?

MR. MISTLER: I didn't lie about that. If I'm understanding that question correctly.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right. Okay.

Let me see if I can shorten this down.

See if this helps. I understand (inaudible) and I'll keep working with it till we get it where it's comfortable.

Are you lying when you say that all the details of Adam Walsh's abduction are from your personal

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observation?

MR. MISTLER: No, I'm not lying about that.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Just yes or no is all I want.

MR. MISTLER: That'd be no.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: No, I'm not lying. No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Let's try those three questions one more time. All three are about Adam.

Regarding the abduction of Adam Walsh, do you intend answer questions about that truthfully?

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Have you lied about any of the details of Adam Walsh's abduction in July of 1981? MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Are you lying when you say that all the details of Adam Walsh's abduction are from your personal observation?

MR. MISTLER: I'm not lying about that, no.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. I'm trying to get -I'm just trying to see -- I ask you the other question,
have you lied about any of the details of Adam Walsh -I'm just rewording the questions is all I'm doing.

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MR. MISTLER: Yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: 'Cause I like to address a specific issue from a couple of different angles.

MR. MISTLER: Okay.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: And that's all I'm doing.

MR. MISTLER: No, I didn't lie. I mean, you know, I want to make that clear.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: The one question, have you lied about the details of Adam Walsh's abduction in July of '81?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Are you lying when you say that all of the details of Adam Walsh's abduction are from your personal observations?

MR. MISTLER: No, I'm not lying about that.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Can we --

MR. MISTLER: Okay. I'm okay now. I'm fine now.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: You're fine with that now?

MR. MISTLER: Yeah, I'm fine with that now.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Between the ages of 26 and 30, do you remember telling any serious lies to someone who trusted you?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Other than what you told me, I'm referring back to your incident when you were

nineteen years old, that's why I qualify this question.

Other than what you've told me, during the first 30 years of your life, do you remember lying to someone in authority?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Is there something else you're afraid I'll ask you a question about during this test?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Those are all the questions you're going to be hearing today. As I said, they're gonna be mixed around, put in different places, but those are the questions.

MR. MISTLER: Okay.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay?

Lean forward, please.

I need you to stand for a second.

Okay. Blood pressure cuff I've put on your forearm. I do put this on tight, the tighter I wrap it, the less additional pressure I have to add to it.

Okay. Relax.

Okay. What I want you to do now is just get as comfortable as you can. I'll be asking you to place your feet flat on the floor, and in a moment I'll ask you to face off toward the corner where I was sitting

earlier. And during the test, Bill, I'm going to ask you to close your eyes. That'll make things a little bit better.

MR. MISTLER: Okay.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Now, in just a moment I'll turn the (inaudible) on, I'll start making some adjustments getting it tuned to you. During that tuning process, I'll let you know when I'm going to inflate the blood pressure cuff on your arm. That thing needs to be pumped up a little bit.

Once I've inflated the cuff, you'll hear me say the test is about to begin. The main questions will come in about ten seconds and I'll space them about fifteen seconds apart after that.

MR. MISTLER: Okav.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: During the test, I'll be asking you to sit still. Any body movements you make is detected by these components, it causes activity changes to occur when on the charts.

If you move around, I'll watch you during the test, I'll make a notation on the chart that that particular change was caused by a movement, rather than being later interpreted as a deceptive change.

If you move around too much, we have to stop and start over till you don't move.

MR. MISTLER: Okay.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: So if you need to scratch anything, now's the time.

Okay. If you just get yourself comfortable, close your eyes, I'll inflate the cuff on your arm just in a few moments. I'll let you know when.

You can open your eyes. I have to make an adjustment up here.

Okay. Sit still, please.

Just relax, I have to make another adjustment.

I'll be inflating that cuff on your arm.

The test is about to begin.

Were you born in Kentucky?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Regarding the abduction of Adam Walsh, do you intend to answer the questions about that truthfully?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Are you completely convinced that I will only ask you questions on this test we have reviewed?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Between the ages of 26 and 30, do you remember telling a serious lie to someone who trusted you?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Have you lied about any of the details of Adam Walsh's abduction in July of 1981?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Other than what you have told me, during the first 30 years of your life, have you ever lied to someone in authority?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Are you lying when you say that all of the details of Adam Walsh's abduction are from your personal observation?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Is there something else you are afraid I will ask you a question about during this test?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: The test is over, you can open your eyes.

Don't move yet, please.

MR. MISTLER: So how did I do?

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: We've got a lot more to do before we come to that conclusion.

MR. MISTLER: Okav.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Bill, what I do at this time, my polygraph procedure is I'm gonna divert

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away from those questions. I want to do a series of questions and do one chart which will give me a picture of what it looks like when you tell a lie.

MR. MISTLER: Okay.
